

#### 3. Context:

The college is situated in a semi-urban area and most of the students hail from rural, even tribal area. These students are mixed with those coming from cosmopolitan background. This form various socio, economic and cultural contexts that the students belong to shape their academic life and progress.

The nineties saw liberalization in India which brought rapid change in the field of technology. It made its entry not only in the field of industry but also in the field of education. The use of technology in the field of education brought a number of advantages.

Use of ICT brings the information of whole world at hand, it makes learning more student centric. Being innovative it increases curiosity of the students.

#### 4. The Practice:

Through the meetings with heads, Principal directs them to increase use of ICT in the teaching-learning process. At departmental level, decisions are taken to optimally utilize ICT facilities available in the college. Teachers resolve to complete at least 20% of syllabus using only ICT. 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#### Annexure IV: Best Practice - 2

1. Title of the Practice: Facility for installments and facilitation of payment of fees to students, and maintenance of financial stability of the college.

#### 2. Goal:

To provide installments in fees to needy students.

To make available the facility of paying fees after getting scholarship.

To render effective service to poor students.

To increase strength of enrolment.

#### 3. Context:

The adjoining area of the college is non irrigated agriculture, tribal area. The students enrolled in the college constitute most of the population of those coming from this area. Most of the parent-farmers rely on only rain water; and they face financial problems in the month of June, when at one hand they have to buy seeds, fertilizers and other related material, and on the other have to pay admission fees of their wards. This results a heavy burden on them. Sometimes potential students are forced to suspend or even discontinue their higher education. Through the social surveys conducted by the college, this thing is apparent in the conclusions. The students, even their parents are willing to opt for higher college but inadequate finance forces them to this condition. The college has primarily thought over this problem: on either side they have to attract students, on another, has to maintain financial stability.

#### 4. The Practice:

The college has evolved a practice to meet both ends: admitting poor students and maintaining financial stability. The students are motivated by the faculty in individual visits, through advertisements, and other sources to get enrolment in the college. They pay provided with two options: either they can pay the fee in installments, especially for the self-funded courses, or they may pay nominal fees in the beginning and remaining fees can be paid only after receipt of their respective scholarship from Government. In this way financial stability is maintained.

#### 5. Evidence of Success:

The practice has resulted into good number of poor students who got admitted in the college otherwise those would have been drop out.
